

An Open Letter from Veterans to the United States Congress

Regarding LTC Michael Kelvington, U.S. Army

To the Members of the United States Congress,

We, the undersigned, write to you not as political operatives or partisan voices, but as veterans of the United States Armed Forces who took an oath to support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic.

Today, we are compelled to defend that oath again—this time not on a battlefield abroad, but in a fight for justice here at home.

We ask for your immediate attention and action in the case of **Lieutenant Colonel Michael Kelvington**, a career Army officer, combat veteran of 14 deployments, Bronze Star with Valor recipient, and two-time Purple Heart awardee. He now finds himself the target of a deeply flawed, politically tainted process that has weaponized the very system meant to ensure justice and protect those who serve.

LTC Kelvington's name, career, and future have been dragged through the mud on the basis of an accusation initially denied by the accuser herself in a sworn statement, only to later be reversed under pressure. No substantial evidence. No due process. No accountability for how Army Cadet Command and senior leaders bypassed rules and manipulated investigations to fit a narrative.

The violations of LTC Kelvington's constitutional rights are stark and well-documented:

- The Army failed to provide a timely and impartial investigation.
- Rule for Courts-Martial 707, the military's standard for a speedy trial, was violated by more than 100 days.
- A flawed Article 32 hearing process was repeated, not corrected, with the same biased result.
- The Army altered a completed 15-6 investigation to match the preferred language for personnel files.
- Medical retirement has been withheld despite major surgeries and a 20-year record of distinguished service.

These actions defy the military's own core values of honor, courage, and commitment. And they send a chilling message to every service member still in uniform: your reputation, your family, and your future can be destroyed to preserve optics.

This is not just about one officer. This is about a system in desperate need of oversight and reform. If a decorated warfighter like LTC Kelvington can be cast aside so easily, then the military has lost its way—and it will lose the trust of those it needs most.

We respectfully request that Congress:

1. **Launch a formal inquiry** into the conduct of Army Cadet Command and JAG officers in this case.
2. **Hold leadership accountable** for altering investigations and bypassing due process.
3. **Dismiss all charges** against LTC Kelvington and restore his right to medical retirement.
4. **Audit current DEI policies and judicial procedures** to ensure they are not being used as political tools.
5. **Publicly reaffirm** that justice, not fear or ideology, remains the foundation of military service.

We did not wear the uniform of this country to stand by while good men and women are destroyed by injustice. LTC Kelvington deserves the honor he earned. His wife Meg, a veteran and mother of their four children, deserves peace. And the next generation of service members deserves to know the system will protect them, not betray them.

We urge you to act now. Not later. Not after more damage has been done. But now.
